

1st Essex Meet - Sunday 17 November 2002



PT History

Ruby Wax's PT - owned now by Ady Cutting, Derbyshire

Quite a few of you may have seen this PT, which is featured in the PTEnthusiasts 2003 calendar – this is the history behind it...



When Chrysler was asked by the motor industry charity BEN to dream up a one-off design for its wacky Chrysler PT Cruiser, the US car company invited zany comedienne Ruby Wax to come up with the goods.

But instead of simply creating a design study, Chrysler offered to make the concept a reality if Ruby would agree. The result is a one-off Ruby Wax PT Cruiser Special, based on a £14,995 PT Cruiser 'Classic' but sporting a £2,000 paint job that would make anybody stand out from the crowd.

Ruby sat down with top Royal Academy design student Dale Grewer to create the unique look which draws on the famous New York yellow cabs for its inspiration. Bright yellow, with brilliant white bumpers and wheels, plus a chequer-board roof and trim. Certainly not for the shy and retiring type!

Now the car is ready to take to the road, being donated by Chrysler to support BEN – and now it's up for grabs with a £10,000 starting price on eBay.

The Cruiser is the 2.0 litre, 140bhp manual version. The car is unregistered - dummy 'Ruby 1' registration plates seen on pictures are just for show - so its first owner will be the first registered keeper with a Y-letter registration plate. And as the car is brand new it comes with a 3-year / 60,000 mile warranty.

CHRYSLER SUPER CRUISER CONCEPT

Introduced: Nov 04, 2002 at the Specialty Equipment Market Association (SEMA) annual trade show in Las Vegas, NV

The segment-defining Chrysler PT Cruiser forever changed the landscape of the automotive industry. The Chrysler PT Super Cruiser show car appeals to a whole new buyer with its high-performance engine, race-inspired styling and innovative technology.

Named "Super Cruiser" for its outstanding performance, this custom two-door Chrysler PT Cruiser features a free-flow exhaust system and a turbocharged 2.4-liter engine that creates more than 300 horsepower. The PT Super Cruiser is fully functional on the road, yet is prepared for road racing with custom features such as a six-point safety cage, six-point camlock harnesses, window nets, Lifeline fire system and Momo race seats and steering wheel.



The two-door PT Super Cruiser features a design theme first seen on the GT Cruiser show in 2000. The car monochromatic front and rear fascias feature integrated bumpers to give the vehicle a clean athletic appearance. The custom carbon fiber hood features exterior gauges, a shift light set in a functional hood scoop and captive hood pins. Llumar created the custom lightweight, bluetinted windshield, while the Chrysler Group fabricated the

remaining windows in lightweight blue tinted Plexiglas®.

From the side, the PT Super Cruiser features sill extensions, wider fenders, 18"x 9.5-in. forged aluminum racing wheels, Michelin Pilot Sport Cup DOT- legal road race tires and massive 12.9-inch Brembo brakes with cross-drilled gold cadmium-plated rotors. The PT Super Cruiser includes a rear wing and custom center-exit twin four-inch exhaust tips. The exterior design is completed with a Chrysler Group/Rohm and Haas custom paint scheme of Octane Orange accented with deep royal blue, which includes glass and rubber additives.

Additionally, the race-inspired interior features a removable Infinity® Entertainment Pak with a 22-inch LCD video screen, 875-watt full surround-sound system, auxiliary batteries, folding chairs and cooler. The package includes an X-Box game console and is completely removable to lighten the vehicle when racing.

Chrysler Group employees in Auburn Hills, Mich., including 10 engineers and 35 UAW members engineered and built the PT Super Cruiser. It was created specially for SEMA.

CHRYSLER BIG SKY CONCEPT

Introduced: Nov 04, 2002 at the Specialty Equipment Market Association (SEMA) annual trade show in Las Vegas, NV

while the PT Super Cruiser is all about performance, the Chrysler PT Big Sky AWD is about a new level of luxury for the award-winning PT Cruiser. Featuring a new twist on open-air technology, the Chrysler PT Big Sky has an innovative five-panel glass lamella roof system, which opens wide enough for both front and rear seat occupants to get a full view of the sky.

Designed by Webasto Roof Systems, Rochester Hills, Mich., the lamella roof system includes five separate panels. The first stationary panel acts as a vent, while the remaining four retractable panels stack vertically at the rear of the window opening. The roof panels and side windows are tinted using Solutia Automotive's (Troy, Mich.) innovative new process that laminates a color interlayer called Vanceva™ between two pieces of tempered glass to create a unique tint to match the body color. This new process provides more UV protection, intrusion resistance, sound deadening qualities and weight reduction compared with tempered glass.

ASC Southfield, Mich., provided the PT Big Sky features a unique ground effects package, that includes custom front and rear fascias, wheel flares and fog lamp treatment. The rear fascia was modified to accept the Borla dual exhaust system, while the modified front fascia features a new open-air appearance, with silver recessed mesh on the lower portion. The profile view highlights the polished stainless steel surround trim that accent the custom Solutia tinted windows, chrome-trimmed side mirrors and chrome trimmed body side



moldings. Other features include 18-inch BBS wheels, Goodyear Eagle F1 tires and stainless steel brake rotors and calipers on all four wheels. The custom rear fascia features an integrated bumper and Borla dual exhaust. PPG created the Merlot custom paint color.

The more luxurious interior of the PT Big Sky is done in light pearl beige with leather seating and door trim provided by Seton, Troy, Mich. Johnson Controls Inc. created the custom front seats, which feature a W.E.T. Inc. Comfort Cools ™ system for heating and cooling. The interior also includes a Panasonic custom entertainment system with DVD video and true multi-channel surround sound. As part of the entertainment system, four video screens are integrated into the vehicle, including a seven-inch flip out LCD monitor on the instrument panel, two LCD monitors in the back of the front seats and a 15-inch removable LCD monitor in the cargo area mounted to the sliding cargo system, which was designed and manufactured by Webasto Roof Systems.

The only PT Cruiser with an all-wheel drive system, the PT Big Sky uses technology to offer better traction and complement the luxury features of this show car. While this one-of-a-kind PT Cruiser came from Chrysler Group, ASC Creative Services performed the custom work and integration based on a design created in conjunction with the Chrysler Group.

CHRYSLER TOMAHAWK CONCEPT

It's The 400mph Chrysler!

The title of the loudest machine at the Detroit show went to the Tomahawk motorbike concept. In reality it's little more than a V10 Viper engine bolted to some wheels, but that's not going to stop DaimlerChrysler's Dodge brand from putting it into production.

Unveiling the amazing machine, boss Dieter Zetsche said: "You will want to know if we are going to build it, and the answer is we might -but it would be a very limited run."

Insiders said the machine would cost \$250,000 (£155,000), but that buyers would have to sign a disclaimer saying they wouldn't ride it - or wouldn't sue Chrysler if they did and fell off. Why the caution? The 8.3-litre motor can power the Tomahawk to 60mph in 2.5 seconds, and gives a theoretical top speed of 400mph. Designer Trevor Creed said: "The Dodge brand philosophy always challenges us to grab life by the horns. In the case of the Tomahawk, grabbing and holding on to anything for dear life is a necessity!" The bike is actually a four-wheeler, to give extra stability. As to how it handles, who knows - all the Chrysler staff we spoke to were too scared to have a go!

The Chrysler PT Cruiser 2.2L CRD

In creating the PT Cruiser CRD, Chrysler has made the most of its merger with Mercedes. The 2.2-litre common-rail diesel (CRD) engine is already familiar in the DaimlerChrysler range, appearing already in the Mercedes C-Class, E-Class and V-Class models. However, due to the comparatively smaller space in the PT's engine bay, it is mounted in an east-west configuration, has additional balancer shafts and has received a small number of minor modifications, including a different turbocharger and intercooler and smaller intake and exhaust manifolds. These mean a lower output (121 bhp) than in the C-Class and E-Class (141 bhp), though it's as powerful as the version in the large, heavy V-Class. The transmission is also based on a Mercedes set-up, albeit also slightly modified to suit the PT.

If anything lets it down it is the operation of the gearbox. The Mercedes' manual gearbox is not the best around, and in the CRD, its notchiness and imprecision is magnified by the long, thin gearstick and awkward circular plastic gearknob. It's all too easy to engage the wrong gear – until you get used to it.

The 0-60mph sprint time may be behind that of the petrol car, but in the real world the diesel feels faster because of that extra torque. Even from low in the rev range, throttle response is instant and acceleration effortless. As a result, overtaking is a breeze and the PT is now a better cruiser, being relaxed at high speed. The mid-range punch means it's easy to make progress with far fewer gearchanges. You'll also spend less time at the fuel pumps - a combined official economy figure from the CRD of 40.9mpg is another bonus, and means substantial savings over the petrol car.

"I've recently changed from a 2.0 to a CRD. The difference is immense. About 25% better fuel economy. The huge amount of torque compared to the 2.0 makes any kind of driving so much easier, whether it be motorways or overtaking slower drivers on the A-roads to get home. It is a little more rattly at first, but it quickly settles down and is far quieter on the motorway. I love it, and wouldn't change back."

The CRD instills confidence that when you want the power it is there, in shed loads and you can feel that there is more power waiting in the wings should you need it. My favourite trick is into second gear and flooring the throttle, the seatback smashes into you and the puff of smoke enveloping the car behind as it appears to go backwards is very satisfying.

With so much torque the car is very forgiving if you 'fluff' a gearchange and first gear is really only required to get the wheels moving. You can happily pull away in second without any worries.

The loss of refinement is barely noticeable, either. The petrol PT isn't the smoothest of engines anyway, and the oil-burner gets extra soundproofing in the engine bay to minimise the clatter reaching occupants'

ears. Going quickly, the Cruiser picks up quite a lot of road noise, and at motorway speeds there's a noticeable rush of air past the door mirrors. But whatever engine noise gets through isn't obtrusive.

"Had a few Diesels, Peugeot 406 etc, thought they were good ride, but this CRD just blows them away, the torque, and overall performance is great, noisy yes, but economical, and fast, and a PT."

"I didn't realise this was a diesel." Becomes a familiar comment as once warm and moving the CRD has not got the 'diesel noise'. It still clatters when cold and on tickover but that is a minor irritant – to some! As the miles add up it may get noisier but time will tell.

There's still room for improvement, however. All-round visibility isn't great as the A-pillars are quite wide, while the vision from the rear view mirror is hindered by the small boot window and middle back seat headrest. Reversing takes some getting used to as does the awful turning circle!

The traction control system fitted to the CRD as standard also seems to be largely ineffective, and only works long after the engine's torque has caused the PT's tyres to lose grip on damp roads.

"I had a water leak which turned into a saga, the clutch is heavy but you get used to it. Fuel economy is superb and the power is fine for a diesel, I can overtake without fear of the diesel factor letting me get along side and run out of legs. the car is as all other PT's absolute sex on wheels a pleasure to drive and own.

Despite its minor faults the car is well worth getting to know. 101% spot on car."

"Best point - Its a PT cruiser, a diesel also tends to be a more "lazy" style of driving i.e. less gear changes, due to huge mid range torque - laid back driving in my cruiser (man, long inhalation;-) Usual other diesel benefits (doesn't mind water/weather, chugs up multi story car parks on tickover, engine always feels like it has bags of power etc.)"

"Bad points - hmmm, need to keep revs above 1600 when accelerating to avoid jerky acceleration/gear changes.

Engine tuning is limited to chips/plug in electronic boxes (though +25bhp can't be bad)"

The CRD comes in Touring and Limited form and the equipment level specs are as for the petrol version.

It might not be the most practical, cheap or even economical of mini-MPVs, but if you want a PT Cruiser then this will not matter. At least it now has an engine which makes that 'I have to have one' feeling a little easier to justify.

Shoe-horning a 2.2-litre common-rail diesel into the PT Cruiser has made it a car you can justify buying for something other than its looks. It may not fit the hot-rod image, but the CRD offers a relaxing drive and greater economy than the petrol version.




I'm afraid there is no PT DIY this newsletter, if there is an item you would like featured, please let us know and we will arrange some instructions.

I did, however receive full instructions from Keith Leebrooke (Khrome Kruiser) regarding fitting Hood Lift Struts; his letter explained the following:



I have fitted Hood Lift Struts to my PT and they are a really good product. They are not plastic coated but billet

aluminium. They are very easy to fit. I was the first person in the UK that Blane (from USA) had dealt with, but he says he is happy to supply anyone else in the club who is interested. He is a really nice person to deal with and he uses Paypal so you know payments are secure.



They in effect are used instead of the lovely little yellow hood prop that we use now! And are gas spring lift struts with chrome rods. Following the latest issue of UK Cruisers, there is an issue with PT's with engines and electrics shutting down. If you remember, I had the same problem with my car, which is why I no longer own it. There are problems with the loombes of Chrysler cars that is not specific to PT's. The only way my problem was solved was for Chrysler to replace the front loombe that goes behind the front bumper as there were "splits" in the individual wires that caused shorts and full and partial electrical failure.

Chrysler and dealers are reluctant to do this repair due to the cost and that the dealers are not fully funded to find and remedy this problem. This problem could also cause errors on ECU's. Based on my experience, the problems discussed on the web site by current members look very similar to mine. The situation can be very dangerous as failure is or seems to be random. Hope this helps the efforts to solve the problems of members,




